
Dear Parents/Guardians



Hillside High Home School Learning **Year 10**

Ghost Town is a deeply personal book of remembering and forgetting, yet when we cross its threshold we also discover the labyrinth of a master storyteller, whose unforgettable characters gather in our thoughts like moths around lamplight.



Igo walking down Stanley Road in Kirkdale where my dad used to have two junk shops selling house-clearance wardrobes, dressing tables, clutter. Ships from Southeast Asia would dock on the Mersey and Malaysian seamen would come and barter for Singer sewing machines. They'd walk back down the hill, a single-file crocodile of sailors with treadle sewing machines balanced on their heads. Old women would come in and talk about their superstitions. They would leave the shop if there was a bird ornament or painting. Once a woman crossed herself because we were selling a picture of a sparrow.

In the 1970s and 1980s, after the demolitions, there were vast empty wastes here, what we called The Debris or The Hollow – the 'oller'. At weekends illegal flea markets sprang up, hunting grounds for bargain scroungers and collectors and a place to top up the dole. We sold books, pots and pans, half-full cans of paint, hub caps, dolls houses, busted radios, records, accordions, cutlery, anything to make a quid. I once saw five fairground dodgem cars for sale, ten quid a piece. Scavengers from Bidston tip across the river would dump their gleanings on the dirt. Old men came with prams full of suitcases and the cases were full of treasure.
