`The Hillside Way'

This week we are reminding pupils about 'Standards and Expectations'. We remind pupils that every teacher has the right to teach, and every pupil has the right to learn. Pupils are also reminded of the need to arrive to all lessons on time and to ensure that they go to the toilet at break and lunch and not during lessons unless in a real emergency. Pupils are also reminded that they need a school bag big enough for an A4 folder every day along with their Essential 8. Finally, reminders are given about uniform and our expectations in terms of wearing full school uniform and not wearing outdoor coats indoors and no jewellery including stud earrings. Most of our pupils work tirelessly to meet our high expectations to ensure that they follow 'The Hillside Way' everyday.

What can pupils expect from each lesson?

- Your teacher will greet you at the door of every lesson and monitor the behaviour on the corridor outside their classroom.
- You will stand behind your chair and wait to be seated, when you sit down get your pencil case out and be ready for learning.
- You will sit in the seating plan that the teacher has created.
- At the end of the lesson you will be asked to stand behind your chair before being dismissed orderly.

We are writing to all parents and guardians to ask for your help over Halloween, Bonfire Night and the days around it. We want everyone to have fun and we'll be working hard to keep you safe.

BUT WE NEED YOUR HELP

Know where your children are

 Encourage kids to go to local events that are being organised, or try a spooky film together

- If your children are going out (particularly on the 30th and 31st of October), make sure
- you know where they're going. If possible, drop them off and pick them up
- Don't let your children hang around the street
- If they're going somewhere local walk there with them
- Have an agreed time when they need to be home

 Don't buy fireworks or eggs and flour for them, and don't let them take it out of the house

Know the risks

• Throwing things at cars, buses, shops and houses can hurt people – drivers might swerve if they get distracted and cause a crash, or someone might get hurt by broken glass (and scratched paintwork can be very expensive to fix)

Getting into trouble with the police can lead to a criminal record, which means not being able to go on holiday to countries like the USA, and not being able to do certain jobs
Messing around with fireworks is dangerous – some burn as hot as 1,200 degrees - hot enough to melt glass and cause serious or fatal injuries

Know the law

If a young person under the age of 16 commits any of the offences below, the parent/ guardian will have to pay the fine.

A person under the age of 16 can be arrested and fined if found with an unlit firework
A person under the age of 16 can also be arrested and fined if they throw or light a firework or make a bonfire

• A person under the age of 16 can be arrested and fined for throwing things like eggs, flour, paint or other objects at people, vehicles or property

Thank you for your help and support. By working together, we can keep your children safe this Halloween and Bonfire Night.
