

Trainee Detective

During the week of the 15th January Merseyside Police enlisted 15 young people as Trainee Detectives, 5 of which were pupils from Hillside and the other 10 being from surrounding local schools. This week long programme was run in partnership with Everton in the Community.

Their task was to investigate a fictional case. This was done with the help of real-life detectives from Merseyside Police and staff from EITC. It all began with a telephone call from a local hospital stating that a patient had been admitted with serious stab wounds. First stop was the crime scene. The snow was not stopping our trainee detectives from cracking this case! Vital evidence was collected from the scene with the support of the Police dogs. Next it was time to move to the interview room were both suspects and witnesses were interviewed. The detectives said how Sophie L and Jack D really led the way and interviewed the suspects exactly how they would want. They said they showed great skill and lots of patience when faced with a 'no comment' interview.

After all the evidence had been collected and interviews had taken place, the trainee detectives headed off to Liverpool Crown Court. Alongside cracking this case pupils heard from families affected directly by knife crime. They also heard from leading Trauma Nurse Rob Jackson who gave a hard-hitting presentation about the injuries that can be caused by carrying a knife and using a knife as a weapon.

This week-long programme is designed to help young people make the right decisions in the future, the hope being to educate them to recognise signs of criminal exploitation. At the end of this amazing week, parents, school staff and representatives from Merseyside Police and EFC were invited to attend a Celebration Event at Goodison. Pupils gave a presentation about their week and what they had learnt from this. Mrs Ryan and Miss Roby were immensely proud to watch our Year 9 pupils address a room full of people with such confidence. All pupils were recognised for their contribution and participation in the programme. Some special awards were also given out by Merseyside Police and EITC. David H, Sophie L and Ellie L all received one of these.

Following on from this we would like these pupils to now become ambassadors and it is hoped they will share their knowledge with their peers. We are hoping to work further with EITC to implement this. Finally, a huge well done to Ellie L, Sophie L, Jasmine I, David H and Jack D who took part and were an absolute credit to us as a school, their families and most importantly themselves!
