### PROUD TO BE

On Friday 9th February, we seized the opportunity to celebrate the diversity within our school by dedicating our second Personal Development drop down day of the year to the theme of 'Proud to Be'. Being 'Proud To Be' is something we feel very passionate about at Hillside as we believe that all members of our community should be treated equally and should feel safe to be who they truly are. Everyone should feel proud to share their identity with others, without fear of prejudice or discrimination from others.



Throughout the day pupils attended a range of workshops which focused on the 9 protected characteristics; age, sex, disability, ethnicity, gender, religion and belief, sexual orientation, marriage/civil partnership and pregnancy/maternity. Pupils learnt about the equality act and looked at case studies where by pupils had to deicide whether or not one of the protected characteristics were being infringed. This session was followed up with sessions on racism and sexuality and the correct use of language. Pupils learnt about the correct terminology to use in terms of race and sexuality and also about language that absolutely will not be tolerated at Hillside and the harmful impact this language can have upon others. It was fantastic to see our pupils engaging in class

discussions whereby they were sharing their opinions in a sensible and thoughtful manner and also asking insightful questions to further develop their understanding of these incredibly important topics of discussion.



# **Deaf Active – An Introduction to British Sign Language**

During our Personal Development drop down day we were absolutely delighted to welcome British Sign Language tutor Susie Williams and her BSL interpreter Katie Godfrey from Deaf

Active Liverpool. Deaf Active is a vibrant young charity that works to promote and enhance the lives of deaf children and young people throughout Merseyside. Susie and Katie delivered an interactive introductory session to British Sign Language to our pupils, teaching our pupils how to introduce themselves and express how they are feeling using BSL. It was wonderful to see our pupils practising their newly acquired skills throughout the day, on the corridors, in the canteen and on the yard! We're also delighted to announce that Katie and Susie will be returning to Hillside to coincide with Deaf Awareness Week in May to deliver a six week British Sign Language course. During Deaf Awareness Week we will be supporting Deaf Active by raising money for this amazing and very local charity!







### **Cultural Market Place**

Throughout the PD drop down day, every class in Year 7-11 had the opportunity to visit our cultural market place in the Drama Hall. Our pupils for whom English is an additional language (EAL) wanted to do something to showcase their countries. There were stalls representing each country including traditional foods, basic phrases in each language and many of our EAL pupils wore traditional dress from their countries. It is my pleasure to share with you in this week's newsletter information and photos from our first ever 'Proud to Be' day which took place on Friday 9th February.

This is going to be a particular highlight of the school year and was such a celebration of the diversity in our school. All pupils had the opportunity to visit the market place in the Hall, which allowed pupils to learn key vocabulary from some of the languages our pupils speak and visit stalls and try food from lots of different countries. It was fantastic to see many pupils choosing to wear their traditional dress.

Throughout the day pupils also experienced a range of workshops which focused on the 9 protected characteristics; age, sex, disability, ethnicity, gender, religion and belief, sexual orientation, marriage/civil partnership and pregnancy/maternity.

In this week's assemblies I revisited the messages from the Proud to Be day and covered the theme of 'Diversity' and the need for everyone to feel included and accepted in

our school community.

I shared the tragic story of Brianna Ghey, not to scare pupils, but to ensure we celebrate her life and share the messages her mum has spoken so passionately about. We have thought about her mum's quote "We have to make society full of empathy and not hate."

We entered assembly to Harry Styles' Treat Everyone with Kindness and reflected on some of the key lines in the song, particularly "I don't need all the answers, feeling good in my skin." What a message this is for us all.

I then shared with pupils the opening lines from our Ofsted Report (September 2023) which clearly state 'Hillside is an accepting community. Pupils feel welcome and diversity is celebrated'. We talked about our collective responsibility to uphold these values every day and how this can't just be some lines Ofsted wrote about us! This needs to be how life is, in our school, every minute of every day.

I finished with a lovely quote from Charles F. Kettering 'A student once said to me that the future was very important to him because it was where he intended to spend the rest of his life. Then, looking me in the eye, he asked "is the future safe in your hands, Sir." I challenged pupils to reflect on how safe the future is in their hands! Knowing what I know about our pupils and the acceptance and inclusive way they chose to live their life's I think the future is very safe!
