

EXCELLENCE IN THE HEART OF THE COMMUNIT

International Day Against Homophobia, Transphobia and Biphobia 17th May



At Hillside this week, to celebrate diversity and equality for all we have been having assemblies on International Day Against Homophobia, Transphobia and Biphobia which takes place 17th May every year and has done since 2004. The purpose of May 17th is to highlight the discrimination experienced by people who may identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender or queer, and by all people with diverse orientations, gender identities or expressions, and sex characteristics. May 17th is now celebrated in more than 130 countries, including some where samesex acts are illegal.

There are around 70 countries in the world where samesex relationships are illegal, and in around 10 of these countries the punishment could be death. It is estimated that 70% of the world's population live under laws and regulations that limit freedom of expression around sexual orientation and gender identity.

The day represents a major global annual opportunity to draw the attention of decision makers, the media, the public and corporations to the prejudice and discrimination faced by people with diverse orientations, gender identities or expressions, and sex characteristics.

Activism has been crucial in many countries for same-sex decriminalisation and changing laws.

The Theme this year is 'No one left behind: equality, freedom and justice for all'.

To discuss:

- Why is it important to have an International Day against Homophobia, Transphobia and Biphobia?
- Do you think there are still times people feel discriminated against because of their sexual orientation and gender identity?
- How do you feel about 70% of the world's population living under laws and regulations that limit freedom of expression around sexual orientation and gender identity?
