The team working collaboratively with the school also have access to a huge number of colleagues from supporting

teams who they can contact for varied support.

The Team Around the School (TAS) can support with concerns on any of the following.

- Family routines, child development, attendance, sleep
- Health concerns
- Speech and language
- Money worries
- Emotional health and wellbeing
- Managing behaviour and setting boundaries
- Drug or alcohol misuse
- Parenting

World Cerebral Palsy Day

Every year on the 6th October people all over the world take the opportunity to come together to celebrate the resilience, diversity and vibrancy of people with Cerebral Palsy. Jessica McDonald in 10SW would like to share her amazing story with you.

"Hi, I am Jess and I have cerebral palsy. I have mixed Cerebral Palsy. Spastic quadriplegic and spastic diplegia. Spastic quadriplegic means it effects my upper limbs and spastic diplegia effects both of my legs. Some people have spastic hemiplegia which only effects one side of the

body. CP is a lifelong condition but you can manage it with physio, speech, occupational therapy etc. CP is a brain injury you can be born with whilst in the womb or if your starved of oxygen at birth (like me) you can never catch CP, it isn't contagious, don't worry! I spent my first few weeks of life on a life support machine and I was cooled in an incubator to

minimise my brain damage. At 3 years old I had selective dorsal rhizotomy 'SDR'. SDR is an invasive spinal surgery that severs the nerves to get signals to the muscles. Also I had orthopedic and neurosurgery. CP can effect everyone differently. 75% experience chronic pain (like me with cramps and spasms) 33% can't walk, 33% have hip replacement, 25% can't communicate and 6% are tube fed. When you have CP you will use some equipment to help assist you like a wheelchair and splints. When I was young I suffered a cardiac arrest and my survival rate was really low. With my determination and strength I now play football and I danced in Paris last year with my dance group and we dance again in Spain this year! My purpose is to raise awareness and to always support people with challenges like me, to always have a grateful attitude and most of all be kind."

Today we are selling green ribbons to show our support and raise awareness for people with Cerebral Palsy like Jess.

Every year, from October 4th to 10th, people around the globe celebrate World Space Week, and in 2024, the theme is something we all care about: "Space Exploration and Climate Change." But how are these two topics connected, and why does space matter for our planet's future? Let's dive in!

What is World Space Week?

World Space Week is the largest space event on Earth! It's a chance to celebrate everything amazing about space exploration—how humans have travelled beyond our planet, and what we've learned from it. This event helps us understand how space science improves life on Earth. In 2024, it's focusing on how space technology and exploration can help tackle one of the biggest challenges we face today: climate change.

How Does Space Help with Climate Change?

It might seem strange at first to think space can help with climate change, but the two are closely linked. Here's how:

- 1. **Satellites Monitor Earth** Satellites orbiting our planet play a huge role in tracking climate change. They gather data on things like melting ice caps, rising sea levels, and deforestation. This information is super important because it helps scientists understand how fast our climate is changing and what we can do about it.
- 2. **Better Weather Forecasting** Ever wondered how weather apps can predict storms and natural disasters? Space technology helps make weather predictions more accurate. This means we can better prepare for events like hurricanes or floods, which are becoming more common due to climate change.
- 3. **New Energy Solutions** Space missions help researchers come up with new ways to create cleaner energy. For example, scientists are exploring how to use solar energy collected in space to power Earth. This could lead to a future where we rely less on fossil fuels and reduce our carbon footprint.
- 4. **Learning from Other Planets** By studying planets like Mars or Venus, we can learn what happens when climates go wrong. Understanding their environments can teach us how to better protect our own planet.
